Vocabulary

Heir - A person who will inherit the throne when the current king or queen does.

Monarch - a person who rules over a place, usually a king or queen.

Reign - to rule over a country as a monarch.

Throne - the position of a king or queen, or a special seat taken by a king or queen.

Significant Places and Information

Important Dates

- 28 June 1491: Henry was born.
- **24 June 1509**:Henry married Catherine of Aragon
- 24 June 1509: Henry became king
- **18 February 1516**: Catherine of Aragon gave birth to Mary.
- 1525: Henry met Anne Boleyn
- 1533: Henry's marriage to Catherine of Aragon was annulled, and he married Anne Boleyn
- **7 September 1533**: Anne Boleyn gave birth to Elizabeth.

November 1534: Henry VIII became the head of the church

- 19 May 1536: Anne Boleyn was executed.
- 30 May 1536: Henry married Jane Seymour
- 12 October 1537: Jane Seymour gave birth to Edward.
- 24 October 1537: Jane Seymour died
- 6 January 1540: Henry married Anne of Cleves
- 9 July 1540: Henry divorced Anne of Cleves
- 28 July 1540: Henry married Catherine Howard
- 13 February 1542: Catherine Howard was executed.
- 12 July 1543: Henry married Catherine Parr
- 28 January 1547: Henry VIII died
